'Down the Well' is something that just invaded my head one day (not too long ago). My last project before this was last year. A 2024 live recording of a 30-year reunion gig celebrating a 1993 live recording.

That was a whole lot of fun. My only two 21st Century albums are both live and both were recorded at the same place, The Kelly Center in Havertown.

I have not been in a studio since last century and am not likely to return soon. So, getting to the point:

One of the most enjoyable parts of my ride was the ongoing cycle of writing and recording. From 1982 through 1997 I recorded dozens of songs in different studios. Some were first done as sparse demos; others were piano pieces that live in the attic and a few more that just didn't fit on the bigger budget projects I did. That was a prolific writing period in my life.

This collection is a representation of the old and obscure versions.

I'll be 65 by the time I get this album released so I'm reminiscing and sharing some of the stories behind these songs. Life is good. I'm one extremely fortunate cookie.

I hope these bring back some memories for the folks who were there.

You can't copyright a title, so even if I wanted to write a song called 'Down the Well', I could. But I'm not.

Curiosity led me to google 'down the well' and see what I found.

I've discovered that it's also a horror movie, a children's book and an uncharacteristically dark Sponge Bob song.

So here are some old, remastered recordings that previously never lived anywhere but on cassette.

"Love You for Living" 1989 and "As If You Didn't Know" 1985

This is a mashup, though I don't think that term existed in 1990. These were just two songs that I segued together in my live act and decided to try it the same way in the studio.

Recorded at Forge Studio in Phoenixville 1990

The rush of falling in love with a new person and for a little while, everything is perfect. The track segues into a song about the ghost of what might have been. I must say, I think "In our lives there's something known as timing" is a pretty good line:)

"Burnin' Both Ends" 1984

Recorded at Strata Studio in Folsom 1986

Scenes from your nightmares. Woke up from a nightmare, got up, drove home and banged this out on the piano. Playing the "romantic, struggling dreamer".... Had a dream about a goblin type showing me a burning candle. He smiled, flipped it over and I saw the bottom burning, too. Still makes the hair on the back of my neck stand up.

I seriously doubt there is any connection between the two but I didn't want to mislead anybody! LOL





"Tomorrow" 1984

I stayed up all night and wrote this song after reading an article that confirmed my initial fears about "Trickle Down Economics". We had shifted gears and the national debt had taken a dangerous and drastic shift upwards. Most people didn't notice or didn't care. How long can we keep this shit up?

"Enlightened Age" 1987

Recorded at Four Star Studios in Media 1988 with Chris McCord, Jim Stager and John Allen

Here's when I "passed the age of consciousness and righteous rage" (Billy Joel). I wrote a letter to a local paper about a one issue candidate who was whining about "tax and spend" Democrats. I pointed out that spend was spend (and no, I'm not a Democrat). You either tax for it or you don't. I was in the phone book so I received calls from both sides of the aisle. The one thing they all had in common was they missed the whole point of the letter. I learned that politics trumps math. Funny how we think all of these issues are "new". How long can we keep this shit up?

"Make Me Smile" 1982

Recorded at Strata Studio in Folsom 1986 with Chris McCord

I wrote this in Georgia when I started to commit myself to seriously pursuing music as a living. I began a songwriting period that lasted quite a long time. It just made me smile...



"Pirates of Hatteras" 1986 Recorded at Strata Studio in Folsom 1986 with Chris McCord

Sitting on a deck in Rodanthe, NC listening to the waves. The Outer Banks has an interesting culture and history. These people washed up on the island and had no idea there was this huge land mass on the other side of Currituck Sound.

I went to Georgia to take a shot at a music career. I knew I'd come back to PA and it felt good to write this while I was down there. I had an awesome 2 years in "Hotlanta" but it would never be home..

"Opinions" 1988Recorded at Four Star Studios in Media 1988 with Zan Gardner

I think this song says it all at times, at least for me. Recorded during the WDYRD sessions with a Zan Gardner chorale. That lady could sing!





"Superficial Man" 1982

My creative poetry professor wrote on my portfolio: "These appear to rely on the superficial observations prominent in song lyrics" Umm...yeah? So I wrote this one for him. "Here's a boy out walking in a world he can't change". The prof liked Neil Young so I guess he's not all bad....:)

"Big Picture" 1989 Recorded at Forge Studion in Phoenixville 1990

This feels like a prayer. The more we change the more we stay the same. My piano playing style was very "living room". I used to play this as an instrumental to put my kids to sleep.


